### 2014 TECHNICAL SYMPOSIUM & BUSINESS MEETING

17-19 October 2014, Plaza Hotel, Las Vegas, NM

Please join us for a weekend of networking and technical interchange!! This year's meeting will be held at the historic Plaza Hotel in Las Vegas, NM, one of the most notable of over 900 Las Vegas buildings listed in the National Register of Historic places. Called "The Belle of the Southwest" when it was built in 1882, the Plaza Hotel was lovingly restored a century later. This magnificent hotel, suspended gracefully in the past, presides regally over the Old Town Plaza.

The meeting begins with a Friday evening reception. Saturday morning is the annual business meeting of the Network - all members are encouraged to attend. After lunch Saturday, meeting attendees will have a chance to tour a nearby university and learn about area STEM education and outreach programs (details TBA). The late afternoon features the technical talk and poster sessions - an excellent opportunity to network. Students, teachers, and non-employed members presenting posters are eligible for a meeting scholarship. Saturday ends with dinner at *Dick's Pub and Grill* featuring presentation of the **2014 NMNWSE IMPACT! Award** and an after-dinner speaker. Members are invited to stay though Sunday morning for the first meeting of the new State Board, elected at Saturday's Business Meeting.


### 2014 IMPACT! AWARD - Nomination deadline Sep. 15

## - Carlsbad EYH, October 25, 2014 "Be the charge

"Be the change you want to see in the world." - Ghandi

There I was, interviewing two intelligent, confident, and engaging young ladies from Roswell who had applied to attend the AAUW sponsored Tech Trek in Las Cruces. Having already met with three young ladies from Carlsbad, one thing caught my attention and I could not shake it long after the interviews were over. The young ladies from Roswell had many more experiences to grow their interests in STEM than our local girls did. They attended a STEM charter school, had been to a few all girl summer camps focused on STEM, and they competed in STEM related competitions. In Carlsbad, very similarly intelligent and engaging girls shared their interests and curiosity about possible careers in STEM, yet none of them had been to a STEM summer opportunity and there is nothing like a STEM school here. I felt very deeply that something needed to change for these girls and the hundreds of others that I did not interview in Carlsbad, and I needed to be that change.

So that is where it started and here we are, connected with a wonderful group of women who also believe in giving STEM opportunities and exposure to young women. We have set October 25th as the date, and are co-hosting with NMSU Carlsbad as we move ahead confident that this is a need in our community and also that EYH is a good fit to meet that need. Together with a dedicated team of AAUW members, I have found that the number of female STEM professionals in Carlsbad interested in being part of this national movement to empower girls is impressive. I'm excited to be a part of bringing our young women an experience that is unique, powerful, and enlightening.


Our goal is to start our first year with 50 girls, 15 sessions, 3 Tech Trek participants, 1 lunch speaker and several community volunteers. ### Las Cruces EYH

April 5, 2014

The Las Cruces EYH was fantastic! We hosted 79 participants, providing 13 workshop choices offered by 32 presenters, and coordinated by an additional 11 volunteers. The energy was amazing with young women in grades 5 - 10, representing 31 different schools, and an ethnicity breakdown of 43% Hispanic, 42% Caucasian, 7% American Indian/Alaskan Native, 4% African American, and 4% Asian. 68% of attendees reported the day to be "Super Fun!"



### Santa Fe-fall EYH

October 5, 2013

I expected...: "boring and not fun at all"
I got...: "really cool and fun activities"

Our fifth Santa Fe Expanding Your Horizons conference event can be viewed as very successful based on several different metrics. The event drew a diverse group of 5th – 8<sup>th</sup> grade girls; geographic - from all over Santa Fe (public, private, and home schooled) and the surrounding communities. Thirty one different schools were represented. The participants were diverse in terms of race / ethnicity – 65% of respondents were from underrepresented groups in STEM; and socioeconomic status – 51% of the participants requested and received scholarships to attend. The mission of EYH is to encourage young women to pursue STEM careers by providing STEM role models and hands-on activities for 5th -8th grade girls. The activities were appropriate for the girls at this age level, with most of the participants rating their workshop experience as "just right" and "fantastic." To summarize, there was a major difference between what girls expected, a boring noninteractive lecture, and what they received, a hands on experience that stimulated learning and engagement, with girls desiring to replicate and show friends and family what they have learned immediately after the event. On closer examination, girl's responses bring to light the greater engagement and deeper learning achieved through active learning. As in previous years, the overwhelming number of volunteers at this event was integral to its success.

The conference was presented by NMNWSE, AAUW, and Santa Fe Institute GUTS y Girls, and hosted by SFCC.

#### \* Claudia Barreto Recognized with 2014 SACNAS Distinguished Community College Mentor Award



SACNAS (<u>Society for Advancement of Hispanics/Chicanos and Native Americans in Science</u>) is a society of scientists dedicated to fostering the success of Hispanic/Chicano and Native American scientists—from college students to professionals—to attain advanced degrees, careers, and positions of leadership in science. Each year individuals who have demonstrated dedication to excellence in science mentoring, and teaching, exemplifying the SACNAS mission, are recognized. One of the award categories is the Distinguished Community College Mentor, which was bestowed upon Dr. Claudia Barreto, Professor of Biology at the University of New Mexico, Valencia Campus. Claudia always wanted to make a difference in students' lives. A first generation college student herself, she realized that a student's early

education can lay the foundation for their future success. The daughter of immigrants – her mother from the Dominican Republic and her father from Peru - she is very familiar with the struggles that immigrant families go through to make a better life in the United States. As a child she enjoyed playing outside, exploring her environment and the animals inhabiting it. When she got the chance to go to college, she focused her studies on biology. As part of her undergraduate education, Claudia also earned a degree in secondary education. She completed a MS in Natural History from New York University, and became a Milwaukee Public Museum curator where public outreach was a major responsibility. When dinosaur fossils were discovered with cellular structure preserved, she went off to the University of Wisconsin Madison. Her PhD thesis was on bone growth in birds and dinosaurs. Furthermore, she realized that by enhancing her own knowledge she could better explain biology to others. This led her to a teaching position at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. In her years as faculty member at UW-Milwaukee, she noted that most senior faculty were not interested in teaching and guiding freshmen and sophomores. So, she gave up her Associate Professor position at UW, to come to the University of New Mexico-Valencia Campus – where she was confident she could provide the kind of early education that would prepare students persist in the sciences and succeed in biology. As a Professor at UNMVC she can devote herself to enhancing teaching and learning by working directly with students and coordinating the institution's assessment activities. Claudia's proudest moments are when she sees her former students earn their degrees and continue to graduate school and or professions. She knows that the choice she made to focus on undergraduate education was the right one. She is able to live her dream of making a difference in students' lives. Claudia is involved in numerous volunteer activities including NMNWSE, Friends of Whitfield Wildlife Conservation Area, and a literacy program in which her Therapy Dogs play a key role in helping children learn to read. Way to go, Claudia!
